Take your seats: At our last meeting before the summer break, Joe Kennedy showed how a chair seat can be formed with a table saw and grinder. Traditionally, chair seats have been formed with a

scorp -- a curved drawknife used to create a comfortable hollow in the seat. Joe's alternative version is accomplished by laying out a grid on the seat blank which can be cut with multiple passes on a table saw. He used a Proxxon grinder to fair the transitions and finished with a Festool sander starting at 24 grit through 120 grit.

Joe is working with cherry to complete a set of dining room chairs. Bill Fiederlein suggested that a good

practice is to cut 1/4" off the best ends of the cherry boards and tap them to see if hairline cracks are present. This may prevent later heartache when the seat blank is assembled from the selected boards.

Mini-Showcase: The chapter has been in planning stages for a proposed demonstration event in the Mid-Hudson region. The purpose for the "mini-showcase" is to spread the word about woodworking to the Mid-Hudson region. Our planned date is tentatively set as Saturday, November 3 at the Hurley Reformed Church. 
