NWA Annual Auction 2019 and Interview with Dick Flanders

On August 24, 2019 the 20th Annual Auction commenced at noon, but a great deal of preparation by numerous NWA volunteers was what made this event a great success. This article will give readers an idea of the essential need for volunteers for this event at all its stages. Readers will learn what goes on behind the scenes in the acquisition, transport, storage, and set up of a large amount of hardwood lumber, heavy power tools, accessories, and hand tools. The Committee responsible for all phases of the auction are as follows: Charlie Goddard (now serving as advisor), Dick Flanders, Juliana Shei, Jon Cochran, and Pete Howe. The two sawyers of milled lumber are Lee Hilt and Steve Oaklander.

Of particular interest to this year's auction was the donation by Union College of Black Walnut logs from a 200-year-old tree on the campus. It was planted in about 1820 by Union College's first president, Eliphelet Nott who served from 1804 to 1866. Nott was also president of RPI from 1829 to 1845. He was a famed minister, educator, and inventor, born 1773 and died 1866. He had over 30 patents for heating applications and steam engines and was the inventor of the first anthracite coal stove (Wikipedia). We milled these logs into 2" thick, natural edge slabs to be sold at our annual auction after adequate drying.

This editor interviewed Dick Flanders for the full story of the complex, coordinated phases of the auction's lumber. People wanting to make a donation logs from cut trees, contact NWA committee members and send photos of the logs. NWA accepts logs such as Cherry, Walnut, Butternut, Hard Maple, Oak (red and preferably white), Ash, Black Locust, Box Elder, Redwood, Cedar (red or white), Poplar, and White Pine. For milling purposes, logs should be a minimum of 12" and a maximum of 34" diameter. Their length is at least 5' and not more than 12'. The ideal length is 8'6". NWA does not cut down donors' trees.

Donors

Nine out of ten donors are friends of NWA members who are referred to the committee throughout the year. If a donor's photos and description of the logs are deemed acceptable, a committee member inspects the location and condition of the logs. The NWA custom-built trailer requires the logs be located near a road or driveway. NWA members Charlie Goddard, Rich Glover, John Olenik, and Lee Hilt lend their trucks to tow the trailer or transport the lumber. The trailer requires a truck with heavy duty tow package and electric brake controller.



Six slabs of the Black Walnut sold for a total of \$1,800, and we have more for future auctions.

Milling and Storage

Milling the lumber requires four to six strong volunteers who wear gloves, dust masks, and hearing protection to help with the milling of the logs and transporting the lumber to the Shaker barn for storing. As the logs are milled, every board is marked with type of wood, thickness, and number board feet (a board foot is 1"x12"x 12" or 144 cubic inches). A day's work is three to five hours for milling and two hours to stack and stick the transported boards for storage. The raw lumber is air-dried for a

minimum of two years in thicknesses of 4/4, 5/4, 8/4, and 12/4 (one year for each inch of thickness). Each stack is labelled with the wood species, donor's name, date when cut (month and year), and straight donation or 50% of sale price to donor.

Lumber Set Up and Labelling


Four days before the auction, eight to twelve volunteers move the seasoned lumber from storage to the front of the Shaker barn and place them in 50 to 70 board feet stacks where the committee makes a list of the donors who are assigned a number and the boards donated are labeled by donor's number. Two days before the auction, every stack is given two paper labels with the donor number, the lot number, type of wood, approximate board feet, buyer number, price when sold, or no sale.

The Bidding

During the auction, a volunteer takes off one of the two labels and hands it to Bob Williams, the auctioneer, so he has the information about the stack's details. When the lumber is sold, the volunteer marks the both labels with the buyer number and price sold. Another volunteer holds sample boards from the stack for the crowd of buyers to see as bidding begins.

When bidders arrive at the auction, they register at the cashier's table, and they are given a large card with their bidder's number. The registry has the buyer's name, phone number, and contact information.

The first of the two labels go to a recording person who enters item number, description, board feet, bidder number and price sold. That list and its labels go to the cashier's table. The second label STAYS on the item so it is identified until it leaves the building. Upon pay-out, the bidder has his purchases totaled to be paid by cash or check. No credit cards are accepted.

Auction's Conclusion and Clean Up

At the end of the auction, volunteers immediately clean up the barn. Large and heavy items might be left over night by prior appointment while a buyer arranges pick up the next day. The committee reorganizes the barn's storage area to accommodate future lumber deliveries.

As the reader can see, volunteers' hard work is the reason the auction generates revenue for the NWA annual budget. Mary Gillespie, Celia Carpenter, Karen Goddard, Kitty Scharl, Juliana Shei, and Austin Spang give hours to record keeping, marketing prior and during the auction, labelling items, and managing payments. Austin and Juliana will compile a spreadsheet of what was sold and for how much to determine the pattern of sales and to help with future auction projections.

NWA Appreciation of Donors

Every donor gets a letter of acknowledgement from the NWA Executive Secretary, Charlie Goddard, which states what the donation sold for, and if the donor wanted 50% of that sale, a check is issued by the NWA Treasurer, Ron Roberts.

Would You Like to Donate Logs to NWA?

CALL BEFORE YOU CUT

We will evaluate your tree(s) for free. If the wood is usable, we will pick up the felled log(s) with our log trailer, mill the lumber, sticker and dry the boards, and sell them at our annual Fiske Scholarship Fund Auction held every year in August or September. Because of liability issues, we cannot fell your tree(s), but we will work closely with your tree service company to avoid any delay in removing logs.

Logs to Lumber to Learning

Before you take down hardwood trees on your property, please consider donating the logs to the NWA. We are interested in large hardwood trees, for example cherry, oak, ash, maple, etc. that can be converted into lumber and sold to follow woodworkers. Your donation is tax deductible because the money raised is used for education grants in woodworking.

Preserve the Value of Your Trees

Quality hardwood trees are a valuable resource located in many places outside of forests. Individual mature trees can be found on farms, around rural homes, and even in older suburban neighborhoods. The logs can be a source of quality lumber, but it is often difficult to get them transported and milled because of the small quantities involved. As a result, fine hardwood can end up as firewood or be sent to our already overburdened landfills.

THE NWA ALTERNATIVE

The NWA can help you recycle your tree(s) into valuable wood that will be put to many good uses, including fine furniture. In addition, you may be eligible for a tax deduction because the lumber made from your tree(s) will be sold and the money used to fund the Association's Fiske Scholarship Program.

TAX DEDUCTIONS

All donations to the NWA are tax deductible. If you prefer not to donate the full value of the lumber, we can share the proceeds of the sale of your wood. The program is designed to be as flexible as possible.

Shaker Site Has Hardwood Trees

According to Dick Flanders, "...about 45 of the logs are White Oak, 9-10 Cherry, a Box Elder and some Hickory. NWA will want to cut the White Oak as 5/4 or 4/4 quarter sawn as much as economically possible, and some rift cut of 2" thickness out of most logs. The Cherry would be cut about the same, but no particular need for quarter sawn." Dick is seeking a quote from a mill operator who has done much work for NWA.

A Short History of the NWA Annual Auction

NWA Historian, Wayne Distin and NWA Executive Secretary, Charlie Goddard provided the information for this article. The first auction was the sale of the shop of Milan Fiske who left hundreds of tools and lumber collected over his 50 years of woodworking in his will to NWA.On October 6, 1996, auctioneer Matt Fraley sold \$6318 worth of items, and the Fiske Memorial Education Fund was created. From then on, the proceeds from the annual auctions go to the Fiske Fund which supports the education of NWA woodworkers and pays for national and internationally known craftspersons to present demonstrations and seminars every November to our members.

The next four annual auctions took place during the NWA Annual Picnic at the Joneville Fire Station until 2000. Ron DeWitt would bring his Woodmizer sawmill for members to have their logs milled. The auction sold donated tools and hardwoods to benefit the Fiske Fund. Bart Chabot was the auctioneer those yeas and an active NWA member. Bart introducedour current auctioneer, Bob Williams to NWA. Recently, Bart passed away at 80 on September 4, 2019.

In 2001, Charlie Goddard was instrumental in securing arrangements with the Shaker Heritage Society to use the Meeting House for NWA monthly General Meetings, the Cow Barn for lumber drying and storage, and the big Hay Barn for the annual auctions. This beautiful historical site has been our location for the past 19 years. And it benefits from NWA volunteers who built the bridge and furniture in the gift shop, refinished the Meeting House hardwood floor, and repaired walls, lighting, and other projects requested by the site administrators.

Dave Parkis Discusses Making Old Hand Planes Usable

At the September 12 Monthly Meeting Dave Parkis discussed some of his methods for restoring old hand planes to usable condition as well as a providing a few pointers about evaluating hand planes that you might find in garage sales. His presentation generated many questions and comments from the audience about his techniques as well as interest in information resources about old hand planes. Because more complete information about restoring hand planes frequently is offered as one of NWA's education courses, this article will just touch upon a few highlights of Dave's presentation.

Dave stated that he generally prefers to remove rust and stain from old hand planes by using Scotch Brite #7440 aluminum oxide hand pads instead of chemicals that may require ventilation and space for vats or tubs.

In his experience the pads are neater to use in the limited space of his shop and significantly faster than other methods he's tried. To remove grease and other grime, Dave uses La's Totally Awesome Cleaner & Degreaser that he gets from discount stores; and for a finish concoction, Dave mixes one part Murphy's Oil Soap, one part Boiled Linseed Oil and two parts of Johnson's Paste Wax.

Dave emphasized that the techniques he demonstrated should only be applied to hand planes and chisels. For other tools, like hand saws or power tools, these techniques may not be applicable and can damage these tools.

Ray Puffer displayed three bowls: one from a cherry burl with turquoise inlays and two from Norway maple logs that he had first vaccinated with live bacterial cultures to expedite spalting. The bacteria causing spalting, he said, can be obtained from either beers or yogurts with live cultures and applied to the ends of cut logs to start the process. Or, he commented that logs can simply be left on the ground and covered with leaves. The spalting of the logs he used aged for about a year.

Steve Vanderzee discussed how he was inspired to modify a couple of box designs he had seen by using magnets instead of hinges to hold their lids. He additionally enhanced the designs, as any wood turner might, by turning their bottoms.

Celia Carpenter, represented by Wally Carpenter, presented a hand carved maple bowel from a 3" board that they had been storing in their garage for at least 25 years.

Finally, Dave Mobley showed examples of two projects that the Crafters SIG has worked on for several months. As reported in last month's Newsletter, the 625 cheese boards are destined to be presents for Curtis Lumber employees from its management. The second Crafters' project comprises 71 award plaques for the Saratoga Builders Association's annual Showcase of Homes event. Over the course of the last several months the two projects provided about 30 different Crafters with the opportunity to improve their skills by using a variety of power tools including routers, planners and jointers as well as experience in clamping and gluing.


