Wood Carving 101

The course, consisting of 10 classes, was organized and taught by Master Carver George Rutledge. The first class began with an overview of the tools of the trade: chisels, gouges, knives, and power tools. The primary focus of the first class was on techniques to use the hand tools and how to use them safely. This was followed with a session devoted to sharpening, sharpening and more sharpening.

Wood and its natural properties were discussed and how we need to take these into consideration when planning a carving project. While any wood may be carved, some species e.g. lend themselves better than others to particular applications and types of carving.

Benches, lighting and methods of holding the work in progress were examined. The class continued with projects in relief carving, incised letter



carving and basic 3 dimensional carving. A demonstration of various finishes and the techniques for applying them completed our class time instruction. And of course, we remembered the possible need for the band aids.....

Members of the class expressed their enjoyment and fulfillment with the instruction and the camaraderie of the class with remarks such as:

"George's knowledge and ability to share made parts of the craft which have baffled me for years, clear. Because the class met for 10 sessions there was a chance to connect with other students that just isn't possible in a weekend class." – Bob Stanley

"On the topic of honing – that is a topic I think we all came away with even more appreciation – whether it be stepping up to the challenge of sharpening a small vee chisel, or just gaining the ability to sharpen a tool with new options." – Jayson Cote

KWA News

Wiggly Snake Every kid has had a wiggly snake made out of wood or plastic. John Franklin showed how to make one of these essential items, using table saw, band saw and lathe. The materials John used were wood and canvas.



A wiggly snake!

There are two key aspects of this project: a) make the inside cuts on a table saw, b) leave a flat spot for later work on the band saw.

The progression of this simple project is as follows:

- 1. Select a wood blank at least 1.5" thick x 3" wide by 12" long
- 2. Cut a series of matching 1/8" deep kerfs on the bottom of the wood blank, leaving 2" clear on each end
- 3. Rip the wood blank in half on a table saw
- 4. Orient the two halves of the wood blank where the kerfs face one another
- 5. Cut a strip of durable fabric like canvas to match the blank
- 6. Place the strip of canvas in between the two blanks with the kerfs facing inside
- 7. Using a small amount of glue, sandwich the two blanks and canvas in a glue-up
- 8. Rough out a shape on the blank between centers on a lathe
- 9. Sand a flat on the bottom of the snake shape or turn off center to leave a flat on the bottom
- 10. Use a band saw or carve to create a final shape on the head and tail if desired
- 11. Final sanding and apply a finish of choice
- 12. Use the band saw to cut from the outside of the snake body to meet the kerf already defined on the inside the receiving mortise for the legs.

If the snake's segments are relatively large, then a wider kerf will be required for the 'liveliness' of the action.



Cut kerfs on one side of a blank.



Rip the blank in half and apply glue to the kerf sides, being careful not to get glue the kerfs themselves.



Clamp the pieces together separated by a length of sturdy cloth or other flexible material.



The resultant "sandwich" glue-up is turned into a cylnder. Once carved and finished, the outside kerfs are cut to meet the inside kerfs.
