September Meeting

Rough to Finish Lumber

*Thursday, September 14, 2017 7:00 PM

Many people question the use of rough sawn lumber from the saw mill, preferring to buy ready finished lumber from the home centers, etc. However, some of the issues that are found in lumber as it dries are still evident in finished lumber from the home center, such as cup, bow, twist etc.

Dick Flanders and Joe Pelcher will discuss what to look for in your lumber pieces and how to work with any issues in the process of getting them ready to build a piece of furniture. This involves understanding of wood movement, identifying where the boards came from within the original logs, and how their movement differs, all by looking at the grain of the wood. Once you recognize the piece of wood and where it came from, you will know what to look for regarding cup, bow and twist, as well as preferred grain appearance in your finished product. Next is what to do regarding these issues, and how to make the best of what you are working with.

You may resolve issues with hand tools, (hand saws, hand planes, etc.), or with power tools, (jointer, planer, band saw, table saw, miter saw), or a combination of both. We will be discussing and showing examples of each defect and ways to overcome them.

Join us for an interesting session with examples, demonstrations and answering your questions.

A Visit to Ken Evans' Shop

Back in January Ken offered a Beginners' Woodturning class to meet for three evening hours of the last Tuesdays of the month. About 12 of us signed up ASAP because we all knew about Ken's many years of wood turning experience, his motivating teaching style, his great stories, his many warnings of safe turning techniques, and the beautiful projects he has made. I put "beginners" in quotes because it was obvious to me that most of my classmates had considerable talent and resources that I didn't. But I had the benefit of two NWA mentors, John Heimke and George Jones, to help me with setup, tool position, body movement, and demonstrations. This is a course I would definitely take again!

On Tuesday, June 27, 2017 the beginner wood turners were invited to Ken Evans' home shop. He lives near Schaghticoke (a pleasant drive from anywhere to see his machines, turning tools, and banjo projects in their various stages. He has unique custom made jig by John Michne who designed it to perfectly marry the neck to the pot assembly of a banjo.

Ken's note: The Beginning Woodturning class will be offered again in October or November 2017.

Mid Hudson Chapter News

Summer in the Valley: It was a busy summer season for Mid-Hudson woodworkers with many presentations and demos. Recapping the high points:

- June

- Ron Moore hosted a discussion on LED lighting for shop use
- Keith Tompkins demonstrated the turning method for a winged bowl
- Club members provided woodworking demonstrations at the Hudson River Maritime Museum

- July

- Chapter picnic held at Central Hudson Training Facility; approximately 30 members participated in BBQ, swimming, and raffle.
- Wally Cook provided a slide show on garden totems and stacked sculpture
- Chapter members participated in the Catskill Forest Festival

- August

- Doug Scharf presented Understanding Wood and Getting the Most Out of It (more below)
- Jerry Peterson did a slide show and instruction on producing dovetails on a table saw

Thinking Inside the Box: Doug Scharf did a superb overview of grain, figure, and cutting approaches to maximize the best features of a timber. His talk covered the structure and botany of wood and the figure that is produced. Examples of various figure were shown on both exotic and domestic woods: curly, quilted, blister, fiddleback, birdseye, crotch, and angel stairs. Doug also explained the causes for different types of figure, including bacterial and insect effects, such as spalting, ambrosia, 'jaguar maple', and flame box elder. Doug described the varieties of spalting: black line, mineral stain, white rot, zone spalting, and extended black staining.

He focused on cutting strategies for crotches and burls, particularly for woodturning. Doug is a

wood purveyor and brought many exotic woods with excellent figure. We talked about CITES and tree species now under controlled export, such as rosewoods. Some interesting woods that were passed around were:

- Flaming copper pot (alcalypha inferno), whose color becomes more vibrant as it ages.

- Monkey puzzle wood, the national tree of Chile and a cousin of Norfolk Island Pine. Monkey puzzle should not be confused with monkeypod wood which can be the cause of serious wood sensitivity.
- Cadagi eucalyptus, which stores water and resin in such quantities that it leaves voids or pockets as it dries. The cadegi actually uses insects (particularly bees) to distribute its seeds.

Slant Board Thank You

The General Electric Volunteers (GEV) Toy Modification Program thanks the Crafters Special Interest Group (SIG) of the Northeastern Woodworkers Association (NWA) for their continued support. The Toy Modification group modifies toys and equipment and provides them to therapists at agencies throughout the area. GE provides a work area and a yearly grant to support this greatly appreciated effort. These items enable clients young and old to learn and enjoy items that they would normally find difficult to operate. We also thank the Woman’s Club of Albany for collecting peanut butter jar type plastic caps that we use in our large “enabling” switches.

The slant boards are a flat surface that can be positioned at various angles with an integral carrying handle for convenience. They are used to hold written material, pictures, paper, or flash cards. The design was developed by Frank Cembalski of the Toy Modification Program and further refined by the Crafters. The Toy Modification Program is happy to provide slant boards for therapeutic use to the facilities we support. Our program provides items for direct use by therapists in their sessions with clients.

Slant boards are used by children and adults with neurological and physical disabilities to

improve their visual-motor and perceptual skills, eye-hand coordination, and figure ground skills (ability to focus on a specific piece of information in a busy background) deficits.

Additionally they:

Encourage efficient marker grasp. The best hand position for handwriting and holding a

writing utensil is in wrist flexion. The angled position of the slant board promotes this position, which provides better support for correctly holding a pencil.

Provide an easier to reach work surface for children who have difficulty reaching the entire paper that is flat on a desk. The slant board requires a shorter reach to go from the bottom to the top of the page. It also lessens the range of focus one has to use to see an entire page well.

The GEV Toy Modification Group, therapists, the many families involved, and most importantly the clients thank the Crafters for their excellent work and support.

- Starting with wood cutting
- Preventing color leaching including several methods and products for sealing
- Attaching wood so it wouldn't move or float when adding the resin.
- Needing accurate measuring
- Mixing & how to tell when it's mixed enough.
- Coloring products and demonstrated several colors.
- Pouring and intermixing of different colors
- Methods of removing bubbles
- Finally cure times

Discussion included the differences in using Alumilite.

NWA's new librarian is Irv Stephens. Over the summer Irv started evaluating and processing gift books as well as re-organizing the magazines. Since June more than 100 new woodworking books have been added to the collection, and a current holdings list of magazines is being prepared for release by early fall.

Each category will be identified by a distinct color label facilitating faster retrieval and minimizing the effect of miss-shelving errors. Over the summer the Mid-Hudson Chapter closed its library. These materials are now stored in bins at the library. The goal is to incorporate unique titles into NWA's main collection. Once the current backlog of gifts and the Mid-Hudson books are reviewed, an inventory will be made that eventually will provide another way for members to identify library resources.

Irv is also considering occasionally selling unneeded duplicate copies of library and gift books at monthly meetings and, perhaps, attempting to sell select books at the Showcase as a means to generate additional library funds. 
