



Showcase 2023 Gallery Update



Hello NWA Woodworkers!!!

For 2023, I want to keep in front of each of you how the Gallery Registration process is going. I am hoping this will remind and inspire you to help us fill the Gallery with items to show each other and our visitors the variety of what is possible with woodworking!

Per the graph below, we are off and running with 5 items registered as of today*. Plotting the 2023 item count against the backdrop of 2018-19, 22 showcase registrations shows we are off to a good and normal start! ** The horizontal axis is the “countdown to Showcase Friday” measured in days. 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A Look at an Entry Level Laser Engraver

Laser engravers are increasingly accessible to the woodworker. One cost effective model is the **Jinsoku LE-1620**. Here's an out of the box look at this product.


Jinsoku LE-1620: Ordered from SainSmart, the Jinsoku or Genmitsu-branded product is a German and Chinese collaboration. It features a 5.5 watt laser and an x-y frame that can accept an 8x10" engraving. Some accessories are available, including a rotary roller. The cost of the hardware, software-key and roller was under \$350 at the time I purchased the unit. Typically, the base unit without the roller accessory can be found between \$240-\$300.

Software is key to running the engraver. I used Laser GRBL and have found it to be a pretty easy interface to use, once a few quirks are understood. Error codes are not intuitive, but there is a help function. Basic issues that an entry level user may experience are:

1. Using the HOME setting to anchor the graphic to be engraved. The anchor default is the lower left corner of the graphic. The HOME setting will allow greater control in placing an engraving on desired spot – it lets the user move the home setting closer to the center of the graphic. Test fire the laser to show where the engraver will place the logical center of the engraving on the target area.
2. Printing Reversal: While the screen display will show a .jpg of your text and graphic in the alignment you desire, the engraving function may reverse the alignment initially. There are keys for cropping and rotating the image to ensure correct direction of the engraving. It's wise to test the graphic first on a piece of cardboard, before final engraving. There is a helpful grid that can be downloaded and printed to use on the base of the engraving bed to line up the piece to be engraved.
3. The Jinsoku has the ability to allow you to manually place the laser in the field and provides a FRAMING function. I've found that the framing function often does not accurately describe the limits of the engraved space. As a consequence, the engraving may stop in mid-run, if it believes that the engraver is asked to go beyond it's x-y limit. The user can abort the engraving in progress and restart, by choosing reset and unlock.

The functionality of the Jinsoku is pretty flexible, but a real benefit is the ability to create toggles. The toggle creates a button for a function, so you don't have to enter individual code settings.

The core functions provided by the engraver are dependent on power, engraving speed, and number of lines per mm. Power

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and speed serve to determine the depth and burn of the laser. Various materials – even species of different woods – will react differently to the combination of these variables. Jinsoku provides a materials database with guidance for settings for engraving and cutting. One of the benefits of a laser engraver is the ability to cut through veneers for marquetry applications.

There is also a selection of engraving approaches which lets the user change scalability and style:

1. Line-to-line is a faithful representation of the graphic
2. Dithering provides a sampling – a pixelation – of the graphic. This selection reduces the size of the file for quicker execution
3. Vectorize outlines the graphic, primarily for cutting pieces
4. Centerline simplifies the graphic by reducing it to central lines
5. Pass Through accepts the settings of the original .jpg with no editing allowed

Likes and Dislikes: The Jinsoku is price accessible and portable. I like the out of the box ease of use. Setting the focal point is really simple – a set-up jig is provided. Clearly, practice is important to master the plethora of options which it presents. As a novice, I have a lot to learn.

However, there are some aspects that should be easier. I wanted to engrave pens both in a line and also around the circumference; I assumed that the roller would suffice for circumference etching. Just to back up a little, the roller hooks into the y-axis controller and a stepper motor controls the speed of rotation, while the engraver works along the x-axis. The issue is that the roller cannot accept cylinders less than 3/4" in diameter. Creating a carrier for a pen blank has been a challenge. The diameter of the outer carrier moves at a different speed than the reduced pen cylinder. If the blank is even slightly off centerline, circles become saggy ovals, engraved off-center. The Help Center techs were not able to assist with the speed settings for small objects. The roller is definitely meant for engraving mugs.

Secondly, lining up the center point of the engraving file is tricky – more an approximation. The software could be more helpful in assigning an exact center, which then can be lined up with a grid placed on the table surface.

Ornament Made by Milan Fiske


Available for Purchase

A holiday ornament made by NWA founding member Milan Fiske is being offered for sale by the daughter of Darwin Rossman. Rossman was a close friend of Milan's, and some NWA members will remember his demonstrations of micro-marquetry at several Showcases in the 1990s. The ornament, approximately 3.5" x 3.75", is made of a variety of woods (see photos). Milan constructed the ornament so the word "PAX" reads correctly from both sides, even though the ornament is thin enough that light from a flashlight shines through the lighter colored wood (see Side 2 photo). Machine Knowledgeable Class Survey Results Will Shape Future Classes

In November we sent out a survey to club members, asking for feedback on our Machine Knowledgeable (MK) training classes. We are very pleased with the response to that survey by nearly 80 club members. We asked for the level of experience respondents have on the various machines in the shop; which machines are the highest priority for MK level classes; preferred class meeting times; and comments on our program.

We received several comments, which will help us as we move forward with our program. Among those comments are:

- One member asked if the MK classes will be offered at the Kingston facility. Curricular materials will be made available to the Mid-Hudson leadership team, so they may make the classes more available to Mid-Hudson members.
- A few members suggested additional topics for consideration for future classes. This information will be considered by the NWA Education Committee in their class planning.

- Several members stated that they have already taken one or more MK level classes, and found them to be very informative, and well presented. They plan to continue taking these courses.

- A request was made that sufficient advance notice of scheduled classes be provided to allow personal schedules to be adjusted.

As a result of this survey we now have a database of members, the classes they prioritize, and the times/days they prefer for those classes. We will schedule and prioritize classes for those who rated the classes as either high or moderate level of interest, and contact those members for registration. We plan to increase the frequency of classes to respond to this high demand. The critical constraint is the availability of Machine Qualified instructors.

Our thanks to all members who have completed the survey, those who have taken MK level classes already, and those who have expressed their interest in future classes.
