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NWA Lumber & Tool Auction 2023 Returns

2023 was our second year of the return of the Lumber and Tool Auction after the 2-year pandemic shutdown, and the event continues to be a success. A perfect fall weather day and our total proceeds and attendees exceeded 2022.

As with any prior auction, it was another great performance by NWA volunteers. Beginning with setup the Wednesday prior, running through the day's long auction and concluding with the take down and packing up, was really something to be proud of. Thank you, volunteers.

Some numbers you may find of interest courtesy of Juliana Shei:

- A total of 74 bidder numbers were issued this year compared to 57 in 2022.
- A total of 111 Lot Numbered items and batches were sold at auction.
- Of these111 Lots, lumber sales totaled approximately 1,850bf
- Another 187 individual sales of mostly multiple items were made in the Cash & Carry section.

- Of these 187 individual Cash & Carry sales, 59 were of wood.
- Net sales were \$14K compared to \$9.7K in 2022.

Carving Aides for Woodturners

Carl Ford demonstrated various aides for laying out and carving Al Stirt-style bowls and plates. Building off his recent article in the June issue of <u>American</u> <u>Woodturner</u>, Carl showed how to make his rotating T-square and layout wheels.

Al Stirt pioneered an approach to platters and plates (both round and square) that feature intricate carved and textured patterns (see Archives (alstirt. com). Laying out the design comes with its own set of challenges. After studying with Al, Carl developed an approach that works well for design layout and execution. There are four aspects to Carl's approach:

- 1. A shop-made carving stand that can be affixed to the ways of a lathe or clamped to a work table. The jig is Carl's design and is described on his website (Carl's Carving Stand-Carl Ford Studio Woodturner). The stand accommodates his chuck; it is adjustable and allows rotation of the platter.
- 2. Carl's Index Wheels are laid out in different diameters. We made the larger 16" wheels. Carl has different options for the wheels which vary the number of indexed segments. He has the vector drawings on his website for download (Carl's Index Wheels - How to Make-Carl Ford Studio Woodturner). The advantage of these wheels is two-fold: a) they make it easy to keep track of the intervals and b) they act as a template to lay out all the stops at once. Carl's layout wheels allow an odd or even number of segments to be marked out, as well as overlapping design segments.
- 3. Rotating T-Squares come in several varieties **Inside** T-square with circular base and a fixed or adjustable blade; and an **Outside** T-square with a vee-shaped base and fixed blade. The circular base T-squares are placed in the center hollow of the platter with the blade extended to the rim. Carl also uses an **Outside** T-square with the vee-base is placed on the rim of the platter; the blade extending to the center of the platter. Each can be used to mark radius marks for the design.

4. Template forms made from acrylic quilt layout material. Although any thin transparent or translucent material will work, Carl recommended the quilt template material, because it is easy to cut with scissors or X-acto knife. He designs a simple template form and uses the negative stencil to transfer the line drawing to the platter. It's very straightforward to tape the pattern to one of the T-squares and line up the intervals between the segments with the marks set by the index wheel.

When the patterns are laid out on the platter, Carl uses an Automach power carver to incise the design. Although this is an expensive tool, it's ease of use makes it a good investment for those who intend to pursue carving as a regular feature of their turned pieces. For those who just wish to experiment, a cheaper option is the Ryobi Electric Chisel 501, but Carl recommends using Flex-cut brand blades compatible with this tool.

How To Get Listed As Machine Qualified

In the NWA Learning Center, we post a list of our members who are "Machine Knowledgeable" and "Machine Qualified" on each type of woodworking machine found in our shop. Machine Knowledgeable members have completed the three-hour class that is offered at no charge to all NWA members. No prior experience is required to attend these hands-on sessions. Beginners gain a confidence in using woodworking machinery at these classes. But you should know that many experienced woodworkers have taken these classes and told us that they picked up many pointers and now can use these machines more effectively and more safely.

Machine Qualified Members are a step up from being Machine Knowledgeable. Machine Qualified "MQ" members may use our woodworking machines with a greater degree of independence, but the real reason we need "MQ" members is to mentor other members. Remember that the mission of the Learning Center is to help our members improve their woodworking knowledge and skills. The more "MQ" members we have, the greater our ability to help others learn.

If you have experience in working on one or more types of woodworking machines in our shop, are familiar with our safety practices (as explained in the NWA Safety Manual), and you are willing to mentor other members, please contact the LCOC. Our goal is to have as many Machine Qualified members as we can. There is no test to take. A simple verification of your experience by other members who are already Machine Qualified and a brief conversation with an LCOC member is all it takes to get listed as Machine Qualified. Please note that the one exception to this is Machine Qualification on the lathe. The AWA (our turning club in the Learning Center) has developed a formal program that all NWA members are welcome to participate in.

In addition to the gallery display of high-quality woodcrafts, BWG members demonstrated special skills to the attendees with continuously scheduled demonstrations both Saturday and Sunday. The highlight of the event was their Silent Auction. 60 fine wood craft items, including five made by NWA members, raised almost \$17,000 from generous bidders for the Berkshire club's scholarship fund. This year four professional woodworking students received \$16,000 in scholarships from the club. All four current recipients had their work on display at the show.

The toolboxes are available to all NWA class participants during classes for instruction, and during Hand Tools SIG or Crafters SIG sessions for practice. Hand Tool SIG members have volunteered to maintain the tool sets.
